INTRODUCTION

The Revised Northern Ireland Curriculum aims to empower young people to achieve their potential and to make informed and responsible choices throughout their lives. It aims to develop the young person as an individual, as a contributor to society and as a contributor to the economy and the environment. The curriculum places increased emphasis on Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) and asks pupils to:

- Think globally act locally;
- Cut down on waste and prevent pollution;
- Save energy and natural resources;
- Look after the local environment;
- Encourage biodiversity and understand its importance to us.

Environmentalists and Development Organisations are frequently viewed with suspicion and often deemed as green hippies or anarchists! As such, many people think of ESD as a supplement to the educational system, an activity that largely takes place outside of school hours and which relates only tangentially to the core curriculum. As teachers with a more flexible curriculum you need to look carefully at the broad range of benefits offered by environmental and development education.

For learners and society to flourish in a world which faces issues such as global poverty, climate change and racial and religious tensions, the EEF believes that education should put learning in a global context, fostering:

- Critical and creative thinking;
- Self-awareness and open-mindedness towards difference;
- Understanding of global issues and power relationships; and
- Optimism and action for a better world.

The ultimate aim in education is to produce young citizens who are prepared to take their place as adults in the complex and challenging society of the 21st century. ESD can enable you as teachers to lead your students towards achieving this aim.

ESD emphasises an interdisciplinary integration of subject matter, problem and issue-based learning experiences, team teaching, learner-centred approaches, and self-directed learning. 






AN CREAGÁN VISITOR CENTRE

Education Programmes

An Creagán is open all year round to school, youth and community groups and a member of the Education Team is always available to offer curriculum based activities. Our aim is to provide schools and the wider community with quality interactive educational visits covering issues such as community relations, biodiversity and environmental awareness. Programmes are tailored to meet the needs and abilities of those children taking part. Follow-up materials and teacher's handbooks are also supplied for many of our programmes.



Community Relations

Key Stages 1, 2 & 3

At An Creagán Visitor Centre we have developed an education programme based purely on developing children's understanding of community relation issues. The course has been developed to meet the more stringent requirements for community relations education in Northern Ireland. Children are encouraged to work as a team regardless of gender, colour or religion. Children are taught to question stereotypes and focus on the positive aspects of change and diversity.

An Creagán currently offers three different Community Relations Programmes. The first is a one day CR school-based visit focusing, on the idea of friendship, inclusion and equality. This fun visit, aimed at P1 - P3, encorporates games, music, art and discussion and is always a great success with the children.

Our second programme is aimed at P4 & 5 classes and is a two day visit using story as a way into discussions on fairness, diversity, bullying, rights and equality. This is a new programme and has been very popular with both teachers and children who enjoy the hands-on activities, art activities, team building games and structured discussion.

Our final, and most well established, now in its fourth year, is a four day programme based both in school and at the centre. This programme tackles stereotyping, rights and responsibilities, equality, symbols and many other citizenship related topics. The four-day programme consists of two visits on site to An Creagán and two school based days. The Programme is suitable for P6, P7 and years 8,9,10 post primary.

Biodiversity/ Environmental

Key Stages 1 & 2

Bog Studies

The practical bog study, developed at An Creagán, allows for first-hand experience of the peatland. Pupils participating in the bog study have the opportunity to see a large variety of plant and animal life, including frogs, dragonflies and the flesh eating sundew! The field studies undertaken show the rich and varied habitat contained within the bog. They provide for the development of values, attitudes and skills while helping to raise the awareness and understanding of the natural and cultural heritage of our bogs and the need for their conservation. As part of this tour children will use our new Biodiversity Trail which leads them around the bog while highlighting the types of animals they are likely to see as they walk along the trail.

Archaeology Studies

Key Stage 2

This programme allows pupils a taste of how life developed in Ireland, beginning in the Ice Age and moving through both Neolithic and Mesolithic Periods and finishing off in the Bronze Age.

The day begins with a visit to our new exhibition which incorporates historic information, pictures and artefacts detailing early life in Ireland. The exhibition highlights important aspects of Neolithic life, the significance of monuments and burial chambers. The tour is followed by a number of hands-on activities which can be tailored to suit the needs of the individual class.

Maths Trail

Key Stage 2

The maths trail developed at An Creagán is one of our most popular tours. Currently there are four ability-based trails available, allowing children to consolidate their classroom learning through the use of practical maths. The Red Trail caters for a Primary 4 class, the Green for Primary 5 & 6 while the Blue is more suited to Primary 6 & 7 children. We also have a Purple Trail designed specifically for children with special educational needs. Each of the tours incorporates elements of number, money, patterns, area, time, relationships and sequences, shape and space, measures and data handling. Children work in mixed ability groups to follow the questions around the centre. Teachers and pupils alike have found this to be a wonderful complement to classroom based work allowing children to put their prior learning into practice.

Story Book Trail

Key Stage 1

A collection of local traditional tales is brought to life using a series of colourful story panels leading children around the beautiful Creggan countryside.

Enjoy the experience of reading outside the classroom confines while surrounded by plant and animal life.

Curriculum Link:

This trail is suited to younger readers (K.S 1 or lower K.S 2) and could be used as part of a guided reading session or as shared reading for literacy lessons.



Summer Schemes

Caters to children of all ages

Every summer at An Creagán we offer a wide selection of activities for visiting Summer Scheme groups. We cater for groups as small as 20 up to a maximum of 90 children. Activities are of a practical nature and vary in price. All sessions last for 2 hours, after which time groups are welcome to stay at the centre for lunch or indeed extend their visit to include more than one activity.

Activities offered include:

- T- shirt design and painting
- Glass and ceramic painting
- Picture frame making
- Mask making
- Puppet making
- Making musical instruments
- Pond dipping/ bog exploration
- Story-book trail

ANY BRIGHT IDEAS

What is it:

Any Bright Ideas is a new initiative being steered by arts co-ordinator and artist Majella Flanagan. It is a bespoke arts education service that runs arts projects to answer the requirements of curriculum skills and learning areas such as education for sustainable development, creativity, citizenship skills, problem solving and working as a team. It can be designed to meet the particular school or groups' aims, resources and population.

Who it is for:

Aimed at stimulating awareness of the many issues associated with waste, the programme takes pupils through the range of solutions available including waste minimisation, reuse and recycling activities. Emphasis is placed on how these solutions may be implemented locally.

The programme is available to children from Nursery age to Key Stage 4, as well as to Youth and Community Groups and anyone else who feels they could benefit from it.

Nursery Schools

This is the beginning of waste education and provides a very interactive approach to the subject. A short story is used to illustrate rubbish as a resource, following which the children will be able to sample musical instruments made from waste.

Primary and Post Primary Schools

• "What a Waste" KS 1 & 2

An interactive session aimed at understanding the relevance of the 3 R's - Reduce, Reuse, Recycle - and gaining knowledge of the variety of materials we can reuse and recycle, and how pupils can do this locally

• Recycling Centre and Landfill Site Visit: KS 2, 3, & 4

We can arrange an educational visit to Armagh, Markethill, Keady or Tandragee Recycling Centres to look at the wide range of materials that can be recycled. In contrast, a visit to our local Landfill Site will enable pupils to witness the huge volume of materials "dumped" by our throw-away society, as well as learn how energy can be produced from waste!

• "Turning Bananas into Flowers" KS2

Composting Workshop: pupils are encouraged to consider the value of composting their "Healthy Break" wastes. During the session, pupils will be shown the various stages of the composting process, and will finally make their own plant pots to "turn bananas into flowers"

*All programmes can be tailored to suit the needs of the school.



Our mission is to identify and promote any work that restores our damaged environment, gets rid of rubbish, and reduces harmful practices.

Through Baglady appearances, film, the web and other media, our campaigns give publicity to good practices, and highlight things that need to change.

Work with Schools

Baglady was one of the first to see that 21st century children very often know far more than their parents about the environment. Children are the main focus of Baglady's work, and their needs are her first priority; she's visited 160 schools since 2003. In 2009, a special Baglady Award will feature in the Irish YEA ECO-UNESCO awards.

Film

We use film to document environmental issues throughout Northern Ireland and far beyond (See our website). Thousands of children and their teachers have proudly shown off their environmental knowledge and projects.

Our theme - the return to RESPECT for this earth and all creation - is inspired by the Aboriginal people of Australia.

The "NEEDabag? 2007" project, our most ambitious and successful so far, has 16 short films made all over Northern Ireland. In the Introductory film, Baglady and the then Environment Minister, Arlene Foster, speak together. Minister Foster is the 7th Environment Minister to meet or deal directly with Baglady.

Baglady Public Apperances

Baglady speaks in public, meets people, investigates, facilitates workshops, acts, writes, and more. She goes anywhere, but insists on travelling ASAP (As Sustainably as Possible), and works with all ages: KIDS and ALLS (Adults Learning to Live Sustainably).

Baglady will appear at:

- shopping centres, town centre,
- tourist attractions, village fairs,
- festivals, fun days, cultural events and conferences.

Work with Government

Baglady initiated the Australian government's work on plastic bags in 2001, and launched Ballymena's first two Environment Weeks, in 2003 and 2004.

The NEEDabag? idea was piloted in Ballymena in 2004, funded by EHS and 10 councils in 2005, then fully by EHS and then NI Screen in 2006-7 bringing in almost all the 26 councils.

Baglady now works with people at all levels of government, in Department of Environemt NI, Department of Education NI, and other related departments in Northern Ireland, the UK and Ireland.

BANBRIDGE DISTRICT COUNCIL

Education continues to be critical to the success of waste management within the Banbridge district and the Council's in-house education programme assists in providing information on waste management and increases awareness of various environmental issues. This programme consists of talks and presentations to all groups from preschool to youth groups and tries to allow interactive learning through quizzes, games and crafts.



Banbridge District Council currently offers a range of environmental projects throughout the year.

Eco-week:

During Eco-Week the Council organises an outreach programme to all schools in the district to children of Key Stages 2, 3 and 4. W5 delivers a unique interactive show on the importance of citizenship and the environment and last year over 60% of schools and over 1500 pupils were involved.

Environmental Youth-speak:

Banbridge District Council organises the Environmental Youthspeak competition every year. The aim of the competition is to get children to think carefully about environmental issues and speak on the given topic. This competition has been a tremendous success in the past with representatives from Banbridge going on to the regional and Northern Ireland finals.

Yellow Woods Challenge:

Each year pupils from all schools in the Banbridge district are invited to recycle copies of their Yellow Pages Directories, diverting large quantities of paper from landfill, and the top performing schools are rewarded for their recycling efforts.

Bee Safe:

The scheme is a multi-agency community safety initiative aimed at encouraging 10 and 11 year olds to adopt good safety habits and encouraging environmental awareness.

Cash for clobber:

Cookstown Textile Recyclers (CTR), in conjunction with Banbridge District Council, runs a hugely successful 'Cash for Clobber' scheme. The scheme prevents textiles from being sent to landfill and allows schools to earn money for use in various school projects.

Recycling Centre Education Room:

Banbridge District Council has expanded the community recycling centre in Banbridge and includes an education room which is available to all schools and groups in the Banbridge district. This room facilitates talks on waste management and sustainability which can be tailored to suit any age or type of group as necessary. There is an interactive 'smart board' which allows groups to play games and quizzes through touch-screen technology. This incorporates a tour of the site, highlighting the eco-features which include a filtration reed-bed, solar panels for heating hot water, rainwater harvesting and a biodiversity area. This site tour provides information on how the waste is managed and where the materials go to be reprocessed or recycled.

BBC BREATHING PLACES

Breathing Places is a three year campaign run by the BBC and its conservation partners aiming to transform 50,000 local green places across the UK, making them better for wildlife and people. The main aim is to inspire individuals to create and care for their local green places by helping with already existing initiatives or by starting their own project.

The BBC is working with more than 50 conservation organisations on its Springwatch Survey and Breathing Places campaign. These include CVNI, BTO, EHS, RSPB, The Wildlife Trusts, The Woodland Trust and Wildfowl and Wetlands Trust.

Waste education for schools and community groups

Our waste education team offers trips and visits to all schools and community groups in Belfast. These can be tailored to suit any age or type of group as necessary.

All of the trips and visits focus on our Reduce, Reuse and Recycle theme and the work of our waste management department.



We offer five main education packages to groups:

1. Reduce, Reuse and Recycle talk

The talk covers general information about why we should recycle, recycling rates in Belfast and current recycling schemes in operation in Belfast.

2. Reduce, Reuse and Recycle guiz

This quiz uses Qwizdom remote voting equipment and is a fun and interactive way of learning about our Reduce, Reuse and Recycle message.

These sessions usually last between 30 and 45 minutes.

3. Trips to our recycling centres

Visits to our recycling centres at Blackstaff Way, Palmerston Road, Alexandra Park and Ormeau show how our waste is managed and give information about where our materials go to be reprocessed or recycled.

The sessions usually last between 30 and 45 minutes.

All groups must arrange their own transport to the recycling centres.

4. Trips to Cottonmount landfill site

The landfill site at Dargan Crescent was, until recently, the destination for all of our non-recyclable waste. Now that this landfill site is full all the rubbish from our black bins is taken to Cottonmount landfill site, at Mallusk. Trips to Cottonmount allow young people to trace where the contents of their black bins go and provide information about the disadvantages of using landfill sites.

As the development of the old landfill site and the North Foreshore continues, we will also keep groups informed about plans for the site.

Groups must arrange their own transport to Cottonmount.

5. Craft sessions with recycled or reused materials

These sessions are aimed at primary school children. Various recycled crafts can be created, including cards, hats, pencil holders and pompoms.

These sessions usually last between 40 and 60 minutes.

BELFAST ZOO

There are three main options for using the Zoo's Education Service

1. Full Education Visit

This service is available all year round for £16.50* per class (max 35 pupils), in addition to the normal group admission fee. It includes

- An interactive session with an Education Officer and a small team of live animals in the Zoo's Education Centre, duration: 30 min. for Pre-school and Key Stage 1 and 45 min. for Key Stage 2 and Key Stage 3.
- An interactive CD which contains: a) a trail to follow round the Zoo on your own; b) topic information for teachers which can be used as a basis for work in the school before and/or after the visit to the Zoo; c) a trail map and pupils' work sheets for work in the Zoo; d) pupils' worksheets for follow-up work.
- Free admission to the Zoo for three teachers per class.
- Full Education Topics include:

3. The Outreach Service



BRYSON CHARITABLE GROUP EDUCATION UNIT

Bryson Education's main province wide programme, Sort It Out!, delivers the Reduce, Reuse, Recycle message to primary schools. Funded by the Northern Ireland Environment Agency and Belfast City Council the programme is available free of charge to primary schools anywhere in Northern Ireland. Visits can be adapted to suit the specific needs of a teacher or school and all visits cover the recycling facilities provided by the local authority in that specific council area.



Sort It Out! Delivery Options

Presentations - The visit can involve one or more classes for a presentation detailed below. Different presentations are used for years 1 and 2, 3 and 4 and 5 - 7 to ensure information is pitched at the correct level.

Nursery - Mr Rat's Recycling Story and sorting activity. (20-30 minutes)

Key Stage 1 - Using examples and pictures to explain what we can recycle and why we should recycle. For years one and two, the pictures are replaced with Mr. Rat's Recycling Story (30 minutes).

Key Stage 2 - The topic of recycling is expanded to include raw materials and the reasons for recycling are discussed in greater detail, using examples, pictures, etc. (45 minutes).

Workshops/Classroom Lessons

Sort It Out! is also available as a morning or afternoon session with individual classes using presentations, games, crafts and activities. Options available include The Material World, a study of five materials (paper, glass, steel, plastic aluminium) and Product Placement an investigation into packaging and products. Workshops are also available on paper recycling, composting and aluminium.

The Sustainable World (Ring for availability)

This programme is aimed at Key Stage 3. Options available include a presentation/ assembly on sustainable living and waste and two classroom options, The Mobile World investigating mobile phones and The WEEE World looking at electrical waste.

CARNFUNNOCK COUNTRY PARK

Trees are one of the most important assets that Carnfunnock Country Park has to offer as an educational resource. This new educational material encourages teachers to take their Key Stage 2/3 pupils on a woodland exploration to discover the world of trees using activity-based worksheets. Teacher guidance notes are also provided outlining general background information and additional activities. Our 'Tree Spotting at Carnfunnock Country Park' publication is also complementary to this material and is available directly from the Park.



There are two core elements to the educational material

A. Environmental Maths

Each worksheet involves experiments or activities which can be carried out in the Park to identify:

1. How old is that tree?

Learn how to measure the age of both growing trees and felled trees. There is also the opportunity for comparisons to be made amongst the class.

2. How tall is my tree?

Children can establish the height of a tree using two methods of calculation, which can be compared for accuracy.

B. Tree Investigation

This consists of the following activity based worksheets:

- 1. Know the parts of a tree.
- 2. What kind of tree is it? Use clues such as tree shape/form, type of tree bark, twigs/buds, leaves, flowers, berries/fruit/nuts to figure out a species of tree.
- 3. Woodland habitat.
- 4. The importance of trees to people.
- 5. Conservation or destruction of trees.
- 6. The role of exotic trees in Northern Ireland focusing on Pissards Plum, Cabbage Tree and Monterey Cypress.

Materials Required

The worksheets and teacher guidance notes are in PDF format and can be downloaded free of charge from the Larne Borough Council website: www.larne.gov.uk/carnfunnock. Equipment needs are outlined in the guidance notes and will depend on the activity which you choose to carry out. The project has been assisted by the Causeway Coast and Glens Heritage Trust as part of the Natural Resource Rural Tourism Initiative under the EU Programme for Peace and Reconciliation.

Costs and booking

This material is free to download provided it is not reproduced for commercial purposes. If you plan to visit between St. Patrick's day and October there will normally be a charge for coach parking. Outside of this time entrance to the park is free. Please remember to book your visit in advance.

Additional facilities available onsite:

The Education Centre is available for hire and is a room about the size of a normal classroom with desks, chairs and a sink. It is located above the Visitor Centre, overlooking the sea. Picnic facilities are also available although there is a charge for the permanent BBQ areas.

Reduce Reuse Recycle

Our primary education programme aims to increase the knowledge, understanding, and interest of pupils in what they can do in the home and school to reduce their waste. The programme is tailored to each school group's requirements and uses an interactive method to encourage children to think about their personal contribution towards reducing, reusing and recycling their waste.

Our post primary programme incorporates presentations to increase knowledge and encourage young people to take action in their own lives both at home and at school.

This service is available all year round, free of charge ,for primary and post-primary schools within the Council area. These visits are customised to suit the requirements of the school and can involve taking an assembly, taking the whole school or simply one age group. School visits are arranged on a first-come, first-served basis.

We also use video and interactive presentations and activities designed to show children the problems rubbish can cause and encourage them to reduce, re-use and recycle.

Responsible Dog Ownership and Staying Safe around Dogs

For some time now Castlereagh Borough Council's Environmental Health Service has been running a very successful schools education programme to encourage children to be aware of the responsibility that goes with having a pet dog. In our presentation we utilise a variety of props, including puppets, to make the experience as informative and interesting as possible for the children.

In addition, we also offer a specially tailored presentation aimed specifically at younger children to help them stay safe around dogs. This fun and easy to understand presentation will hopefully promote the message of treating dogs with the correct level of caution and respect, thus lessening the possibility of injury to the child through an incorrect approach to their own or their friend's pet dogs.

If you are currently running any projects on pets (particularly dogs) or on the role of people whose job provides a service or help to the local community, then our officers will be delighted to visit your school.

What is the Centre for Global Education?

The Centre for Global Education is a resource base for global and developing world studies. It promotes a form of education designed to increase understanding of international development issues and encourage action that will tackle the problems underpinning poverty and inequality throughout the world.

The Centre was established in 1986 to challenge stereotypes of developing countries prominent in our society and provide education services that offer a closer examination of the factors underpinning poverty in the developing world. The Centre encourages learners at a local level to examine the shared historical and contemporary links between Ireland and developing countries including famine, conflict and colonialism. These links are explored through publications, conferences, seminars and training workshops delivered to local audiences.

What is Development Education?

The Centre promotes a form of education that is variably called development education, global education, global citizenship or development awareness. All of these labels share the following components:

- An exploration of development issues such as globalisation, trade, justice, conflict, gender, the environment and child work.
- Promoting values, skills, attitudes, knowledge and understanding consistent with social justice and equality.
- The use of active learning methodologies to foster independent, critical thinking, self-confidence, self-awareness and good communication skills.
- Work with a wide range of target groups from pre-school through to adult groups such as teachers, student teachers, adult educators and youth workers.
- The provision of resources for use in the formal and non-formal education sectors.
- Encouraging action that will effect social change. It is imperative that learners take action that will address poverty-related problems at local and international levels. As the writer Alice Walker stated 'activism is my rent for living on this planet'.

Development Education Journal

The Centre receives financial support from Irish Aid to publish a bi-annual development education journal, *Policy and Practice: A Development Education Review.* The journal carries high quality, peer-reviewed articles on themes central to development education practice such as Global Citizenship, links with the global South, and research in DE. 

CHILDREN IN CROSSFIRE

Children in Crossfire is a non government development organisation based in Derry/Londonderry and has been working in countries throughout the world to fight poverty and promote social justice. The charity was established by Richard Moore who, at the age of 10, was blinded by a rubber bullet. A decade ago, he decided to dedicate his life to the service of humanity, particularly children around the world who have been caught in crossfire, poverty and hunger. Recently we have established projects in Ethiopia and Tanzania, working with local people and grassroots organisations.



In addition to the overseas work that we undertake, we also work at home in Ireland running a range of development education programmes. Within the north west of Ireland we are committed to supporting the learning and growth of people in their knowledge around local and global issues. The development education team works within schools and also within the local community to pass on knowledge and skills that will empower both individuals and communities to participate in action for a more just, equal and shared world.

The Development Education team are involved in various projects, including:

- TIDAL- an accredited (OCN) course aimed at developing the confidence and skills of post-primary teachers using creative and participative methodologies, exploring values and incorporating a global dimension into their teaching and the wider school community. The course is part of a wider 3-year project which aims to promote active citizenship through providing training for teachers and showcasing a play around schools, using theatre as a tool for social change.
- Outside of schools we do work with women's groups, businesses, youth and community groups and churches, raising awareness and encouraging action towards creating a more just and equal world.
- We also host monthly seminars aimed at the general public, exploring issues such as ethical consumption, women's rights, energy and resources.

COLIN GLEN FOREST PARK

Colin Glen Forest Park is a beautiful wooded river glen, consisting of 200 acres of scenic woodland, grass land, waterfalls and ponds. From there a broadleaf woodland of Oak, Ash, Beech, Willow and Hazel trees, as well as a range of wildflowers, insects and birds including Grey Herons, Sparrowhawks and Treecreepers, can be explored. The site is managed by the Colin Glen Trust, formed in 1989 to improve the natural environment around Colin Glen. For almost 20 years the Colin Glen Trust has delivered a wide range of Environmental Education progammes to schools and colleges through a dedicated team of Environmental Education Officers based at the Colin Glen Forest Park Centre. Fully equipped education class rooms are used to brief groups before entering the 200 acre forest park with its key feature, the Colin River.

Schools from Craigavon, Newtownards, Antrim and the greater Belfast area can access the delivery of courses to 'A Level' standard in one day, making best use of limited financial resources in the CEA and EMU approved facility. The Colin Glen Trust has an Environmental Education division which carries out curriculum-based environmental education, a Conservation Volunteer division which offers a wide variety of volunteering opportunities, and a ranger service which carries out patrols of the park seven days a week.



In 2005 the Colin Glen Forest Park became the first site in the Belfast and Lisburn area to gain endorsement from the CEA (the Curriculum for Education and Assessment for Northern Ireland), and it is also a main provider of the Education for Mutual Understanding Programme (EMU).

Colin Glen provides curriculum-linked environmental activities and classes for all educational stages, from nursery school through Key stages 1-4 GCSE and A-Level and on to third level education.

Students are able to carry out studies on the forest, the river, the pond, geology and ecology in the Glen in order to gain attainment targets in Biology, Geography, and Geology at various levels in the curriculum.

Available Programmes

A number of environmental programmes are provided at Colin Glen Forest Park. This is not a definitive list and any of the programmes may be adapted to suit the needs of the individual groups or to work in conjunction with the existing curriculum teaching programme. It is also possible to develop a completely new programme to meet other needs.

Key Stage 1 & 2 Topics

Water related topics

- River study Looking at the catchment area of the Colin River and observing typical features from its source to its mouth.
- Study of freshwater ecosystems Awareness of living things, use of identification keys, water quality surveys, food chains, life cycles and habitat comparisons.

Forest Topics

- Bird Trail A light-hearted trail and an opportunity to study ecology and patterns of behaviour.
- Guided Woodland Tour Identifying and looking at coniferous and broad-leaved trees, other vegetation, fungi, wildlife and minibeasts.
- Minibeasts Insect and invertebrate trapping and identification. Looking at habitats and behaviour.

Geological Topics

The glen is an excellent location for geological visits and is a recognised Site for Local Nature Conservation Improtance, and important for its unique geological features. The Glen provides different rock types and strata, geological features, a site of a clay excavation industry and a plethora of fossil evidence.

Practical Conservation

Mainly tree planting in winter, but other activities such as seed collection, tree thinning, laurel clearing or river cleans ups are all possible for small groups, in particular in the older age range. It is also possible to arrange some work experience placements in the Forest Park or on the Golf Course by arrangement with the Golf Course Manager or Forest Park Manager.

Geography Exercises

- River Study This is the most popular activity undertaken by secondary school visitors. Safe access to the river is available for the study of erosion and deposition features, bank retention features, fossils, bio-indicator species, water quality and habitat diversity. Geographical features can be studied including river discharge, pebble roundness, river course, topography, valley slope, land use, conservation and conflict of use management.
 - Forest and Forest ecology Biogeographical studies of forest environments, light, temperature and humidity comparisons.
 - Soil Survey Simple soil testing, outlining properties of forest soils and recording characteristics such as colour, texture and soil pH.
 - *Visitor Surveys* A stimulus for human use survey, foot counts, questionnaire composition etc. The Park has been used in human geographical studies of all types.

Geological studies


The location for many a historical geological visit, the Glen provides several different rock types, geological features, a site of a clay excavation industry and a plethora of fossil evidence.

Biology Exercises

- Forest ecology Studies of the relationship between light penetration and vegetation cover. Tree girth measurements to compare different age samples of the same species.
- *Vegetation Studies* Line and quadrat surveys comparing woodland with meadowland, established habitat with areas of colonising plants, effect of canopy, slope and drainage on ground flora, etc.
- Freshwater Ecology Study of freshwater creatures in their natural environment Studies to determine pollution levels in lake/pond, Management strategy for the pond/lake. The two safe, accessible ponds provide ample scope for scientific research at all levels.

New programmes are being prepared which will include a new Heritage Trail and in partnership with Colin Glen Compost, programmes around re-cycling and hydro electric power generation will soon be available to schools.

Environmental Programmes

The Green Machine is operated by CVNI's Education Officer, providing tailored interactive workshops on a range of subjects linked to the curriculum including:-

- Waste management and recycling,
- Life cycles and food chains,
- Biodiversity.

Environmental improvements

Practical projects e.g. improving the school grounds by planting trees.

The CVNI Biodiversity Campaign provides a programe of free training events and workshops open to the public to raise awareness and understanding of biodiversity. There is also advice and support for people who manage land for the benefit of biodiversity through training courses, workshops and the development of exemplar sites. Biodiversity Officers, farmers, teachers etc. who want to learn more or develop skills to help particular aspects of Northern Ireland's biodiversity should make use of this opportunity.

School Grounds Development Projects - CVNI can support work to improve school grounds anywhere in Northern Ireland from one of our five local offices. Our aim is to involve pupils and teachers in the design, implementation, maintenance and use of school grounds development projects. Teachers are encouraged to maximise opportunities to incorporate the curriculum into activities such as creating habitats (e.g. ponds, woodlands, wildflower meadows and hedges) and access to them (e.g. paths). We can also undertake practical work where required. Costs are variable depending upon project size, duration and materials required.

COUNTRYSIDE ACCESS & ACTIVITIES NETWORK

The Northern Ireland Countryside Access and Activities Network (CAAN) is an umbrella organisation which brings together all groups and bodies which have an interest or involvement in countryside recreation in Northern Ireland. This includes:

- Those participating in countryside recreation activities
- Local and central government organisations
- Farmers and landowners
- Providers of outdoor education
- Environmental and community organisations
- Youth organisations

The Network was established in 1999 in response to the publication of Northern Ireland's first Countryside Recreation Strategy in November 1998. It is charged with the strategic development, management and promotion of countryside recreation across Northern Ireland. The Network is responsible for undertaking practical countryside recreation projects. These projects are delivered for the Network by a company, Countryside Recreation: Northern Ireland. The Company is linked directly to the Network through its membership.

ECOTRAILS

ECOTRAILS provides an opportunity for young people to develop an awareness, appreciation and understanding of, and responsibility for, their local natural and built environment by taking part in environmental trails linked to the sport of orienteering.

ECOTRAILS is targeted at Key Stage 2/3 and at some locations there are staff available to advise and assist.

Each ECOTRAIL pack contains an Activity Booklet covering a range of environmental/historical topics, a Leader's Guide for the Activity Booklet, a separate leader's Guide for Orienteering, a specially produced map of the locality plus additional items such as a Tree Identification chart. The resources are available free on CD or through the website www.ecotrailsni.com.

CRAIGAVON BOROUGH COUNCIL

Free Recycling Education Programme

With recycling now such an important aspect of everyday life, education for all is vitally important. Craigavon Borough Council offers a free education programme on the importance of recycling to children from nursery age to Key Stage 3 as well as community groups, church groups and anyone else who feels they could benefit from it.

Nursery Schools

This is the beginning of an education in recycling and provides a very interactive approach to the subject. A toy bin lorry is used to illustrate where rubbish goes and the children get to touch and feel a lot of materials that are recyclable.

Primary Schools

The concept of the 'Three R's' is brought in at this level through a short presentation, a DVD and a quiz on what the children have seen and heard throughout the lesson. They will also be able to see a range of products that have been made from recycled materials.

Secondary Schools

This follows on from the primary school programme but takes it to a more detailed level.

All programmes can be changed or altered to suit the needs of the teacher, and are directly linked into waste issues and bin schemes within homes in the Borough of Craigavon.

On top of delivering these programmes, the Council also offers visits to the local civic amenity sites where children can see at first hand where material can be taken for recycling.

Teachers can also be provided with classroom education packs on waste issues which include a number of projects that can be used as a follow-up to the school visit. Each project is cross-curricular.

The Council can also aid those schools who want to become involved in the European recognised Eco-Schools programme.

Cluster meetings for teachers are arranged bi-annually to discuss the programme and act as a medium to share ideas.

Presentations can be carried out all year round and outside working hours so that Women's Institutes, Girls' Brigades, Boys' Brigades, community groups and youth groups can all avail of the service.

CREGGAN COUNTRY PARK

Creggan Country Park Enterprises is a not-for-profit social firm established in February 1997, located on the 100-acre former Creggan Reservoirs site on the Northern boundary of Derry's Creggan estate. It aims to provide balanced opportunities in training, employment, recreation and education for the local community.

There is a wide range of activities available for visitors including canoeing,

kayaking, sailing, team building exercises, assault course, orienteering and the recently introduced environmental education programme 'Nature's Classroom.' Creggan Country Park works continuously to encourage environmental awareness through programmes of environmental education, planting and community clean up programmes and a robust development programme incorporating renewable energy technologies which include a 20kW wind turbine and a hydro-electric scheme. The Creggan Country Park activity centre also features a turf roof which is designed for energy efficiency.



'Nature's Classroom' is funded by the Department of Social Development and is available for schools and community groups free of charge all year round. Activities



can take place on our 100-acre site or alternatively our Environmental Officer can bring the activities to you! There are 13 educational themes to choose from including 'Power from the Planet or Renewable Energy Workshop' which gets pupils up close to renewable technologies. The Big Bug Hunt and Treemendous Tree Hunt are fantastic ways to get pupils up close to nature. We have recently introduced an historical tour of our site led by local Blue Badge tour guide Michael Cooper. Pupils will learn about how the site was developed

from being the city's main water supply to the outdoor pursuits facility it is today.

The Primary education programme links into the subject area 'The World Around Us' in the revised curriculum for NI. Our post primary themes are related to Learning for Life & Work—local and global citizenship, Geography and Science in the revised curriculum.

School visits are arranged on a first come first served basis. Activities available on site and require advanced booking.

DOWN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Down District Council currently undertakes a variety of educational talks to primary and secondary schools in the Council area. These include the following:

Option 1. 'Reduce, Reuse, Recycle' KS 1&2

During this session the pupils are encouraged to understand the relevance of the three R's and gain some knowledge of the variety of materials we can recycle. The session takes about half an hour for KS1 and one hour for KS2, and includes a short video and some recycling games.

Option 2. 'Household Recycling Centre & Landfill Site Visit' KS 2&3

Educational Visit to Castlewellan Household Recycling Centre to look at the wide variety of materials that can be recycled. In stark contrast, the Group visits Drumnakelly landfill site to witness the huge volume of materials that have been dumped by our throw away society.

Option 3. 'Creating Carrots from Bananas?' KS 2

Composting workshop. Pupils are encouraged to recognise the value of composting their school waste and keeping the Earth's dwindling resources out of landfill. During this one hour session they can see compost in various stages (from a brown aging banana peel, to a rich earthy compost) and finally, set up a compost bin for the school to use.

Option 4. 'Out with the Litter Lout!' KS 2&3

Litter is a HUGE problem, but we can all do something about it. The session aims to cover the problems associated with litter, including either slides or a short cartoon video. In addition, the group gets the opportunity to carry out a litter pick within their own school grounds.



ECO-SCHOOLS

In Northern Ireland Eco-Schools is managed by TIDY Northern Ireland, an organisation which also runs a varitye of campaigns and manages other local environmental quality programmes such as Blue Flag for beaches. Eco-Schools is a programme that supports the Revised Curriculum for Northern Ireland and its emphasis is on Education for Sustainable Development (ESD).

TIDY Northern Ireland runs Eco-Schools in Northern Ireland using an extensive range of partners and with support from local councils, the Education and Library Boards and the Northern Ireland Environment Agency.

Eco-Schools is an internationally recognised award scheme operating across 43 countries (with backing from the United Nations) rewarding and accrediting schools who have made a commitment to continuously improving their environmental performance. It is also a learning resource, raising awareness of environmental issues through activities that link to curriculum subjects.





The Aim of Eco-Schools

Eco-Schools is a pupil-led environmental programme based on an Environmental Management Audit approach. Its aim is to make environmental awareness and action an intrinsic part of the life and ethos of the school for both pupils and staff.

How does Eco-Schools Work?

There are three progressive levels of award. The first two levels are the Bronze and Silver certificates. The prestigious Green Flag is awarded to schools which meet the top level criteria for each of the seven steps of the Eco-Schools process.

Topics Supported by Eco-Schools

The environment can be incorporated into all aspects of the curriculum, and Eco-Schools has a number of topics that should be examined by schools as they make their way through the Eco-Schools programme and series of awards. The topics to be covered include:

Litter Transport School Grounds Waste Water Biodiversity

Healthy Eating Energy Global Perspective

EXPLORIS

What is Exploris?

Exploris, Northern Irelands' Aquarium, is ideally sited on the shores of a marine nature reserve and Area of Special Scientific Interest - Strangford Lough.

A visit to Exploris enables the visitor to view and learn about the marine species that are indigenous to Strangford Lough and the coastline of the island. Marine communities are recreated to enable the visitor to gain a better understanding of the complex inter-relationships between different species. The Seal Sanctuary affords the visitor the opportunity to view the process of rehabilitation of rescued seal pups from their arrival through to full health when they are re-introduced to the wild.

Education Activities

Exploris is the perfect venue for an educational or group visit for all ages with various activities including:

Discovery Pools

A chance for your group to discover a variety of living animals at close hand. For example observe Rays, Starfish and Sea Urchins. Exploris Discovery Pools are run by experienced guides who help to break down inhibitions and develop an appreciation of nature.

Aquarium Tour

A guide leads your group on a journey through the aquarium starting with displays focusing on Strangford Lough and moving on to the Irish Sea via themed display tanks. Also learn about seal rehabilitation from the rescue of seals to their release back into the wild.

Shore Walks

Shore walks are available at certain times depending on the tides in Strangford Lough. These afford pupils the opportunity to learn about life on the shore. Educational staff accompany your group to a local rocky shore to study living things in their natural habitat.

Winter Roadshow

Bring the 'Exploris Mobile Rockpool' to your school this winter and enjoy an interactive display of underwater creatures without leaving the classroom! The Winter Roadshow runs between October and March, with prices varying according to the size of your school. Our Education Officer can tailor the programme for your school's needs, providing themed talks pitched at Key Stages 1+2 focusing on curriculum areas incorporating topics such as Conservation, Citizenship, Animal Habitats or Sea Creatures.



FIELD STUDIES COUNCIL DERRYGONNELLY

FSC Derrygonnelly Centre lies in the unspoilt West Fermanagh countryside, 10 miles from Enniskillen and only 15 miles from the Donegal coast. The field centre opened in 2001 and has since been running courses for all age groups in biology and geography field work. The Field Studies Council (FSC) is a pioneering educational charity committed to bringing environmental understanding to all.

BRINGING ENVIRONMENTAL Understanding To All

Established in 1943, the FSC has become internationally respected for its national network of 17 education centres, international outreach training projects, research programmes, and information and publications service. We provide informative and enjoyable opportunities for people of all ages and abilities to discover, explore, be inspired by and understand the natural environment. The FSC believes the more we know about the environment, the more we can appreciate its needs and protect its diversity and beauty for future generations.

Courses and Facilities

Derrygonnelly Field Centre is equipped with purpose-built classrooms and residential facilities for up to 65 students. We offer a range of courses from day visits to week long residential courses.

The Centre has a range of habitats onsite including grassland, a small area of trees, a pond and the River Sillees which runs through the Centre grounds. We use nearby field sites to study geography and biology including sand dunes and rocky shore ecology on the Donegal coast, river processes and ecology along the River Sillees and woodland studies beside Lower Lough Erne. It is our aim to deliver curriculum based courses which comprehensively cover fieldwork requirements and increase students' knowledge and understanding, as well as promote team spirit, enjoyment and respect for the countryside.

The Centre is open all year round. We offer a range of field courses to meet the needs of each visiting group. All equipment and learning materials are provided and each course includes an introduction and follow-up session. Please feel free to contact a member of the education team to discuss a programme or for further information.

Answer:

Come to a Forest Service workshop or book a visit to one of the 113 forests where there will be Forest Service Guide to facilitate you in the development and enhancement of your students' knowledge understanding, values and attitudes to the forest environment within both a local and global context.

No matter whether you teach Maths, Geography, Science, History, English, Politics, Religious Education, Foreign Languages, Music, Art and Design, or ICT; the forest environment will provide your students with an unequalled opportunity to be creatively inspired, gain problem-solving and/or practical skills in one or more subjects of the NI Curriculum, and at the same time develop personal, interpersonal and communication skills.

NB: There is a forest within 10 miles of almost every school in Northern Ireland

Why use the Forest Service?

The forest industry is an excellent example for demonstrating sustainable development because it is involved in economic development of the timber industry, environmental land management in the countryside and has a major social impact providing a recreational resource.

Remember - educational visits with a guide are FREE

Forest Service Sustainable Forestry Education Programme

The programme is designed to encourage students to work in small groups to solve problems, question environmental management and design a sustainable forest for their community, local and global, in the 21st century.

Programme features:

- Programme facilitated by forest guides,
- Students work in small teams,
- Study of a local forest and local issues,
- Indoor and outdoor exercises,
- Forestry field work techniques used,
- Teachers' notes for follow up activities,
- Programme can be completed in one day, or split into separate sections for detailed further study: economic, environmental, social factors.

Other formal programmes include the 'Peace Maze' at Castlewellan and the 'World Around Us' at Tollymore. However, programmes can be created to suit the needs of anyone. This maybe discussed with one of the Forest Guides at the contact points listed in the information bar.



Inset Days:

A pilot training day attended by teachers, ELB advisors and representatives from CCEA and NICIE took place on the 5th June 2008 at Malone House, Belfast. Further training days will take place next school year for more groups of teachers from schools throughout the five ELB regions. Participants involved in the training day will provide feedback on resources and training to inform further INSET days and aid in the sharing of good practice for teachers who have not yet engaged with global issues in their contexts. The INSET days consist of exploring global issues using the OSDE methodology and input from development NGOs working with schools. Research:

Global Dimension in Schools NI has just commissioned research to assess how the global dimension is being delivered through the curriculum. Research consultants from the University of Ulster, Coleraine and Queen's University Belfast are conducting the research.



GROUNDWORK NORTHERN IRELAND

Groundwork is a federation of more than 40 not-for-profit Trusts in England, Wales and Northern Ireland. Groundwork NI focuses on delivering regeneration in areas of need throughout Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland.

Programmes

Groundwork NI is working with over 100 urban and rural communities across Northern Ireland and the border regions through a wide range of environmental programmes. A sample of these include:

Alpha Programme

A partnership among Groundwork NI, Lisburn City Council, Belfast City Council, the Housing Executive and Alpha Resource Management Ltd which uses landfill tax credits from the Mullaghglass landfill site to support the development of community amenities and the enhancement of biodiversity within the Belfast and Lisburn areas.

Greencare North West

A partnership between Groundwork NI, Derry City Council and the Housing Executive which works with communities across the Derry City Council area to develop and deliver community engagement and environmental regeneration projects.

Re-Imaging Communities Programme

Groundwork NI has been appointed by the Arts Council to provide technical assistance, where required, to groups or organizations applying to the Re-Imaging Communities Programme. This involves community consultation, development of designs and costings and liaison with artists.

Landscape Architecture Services

This includes sketch design and costing, 3-d design modelling, contract documentation, tendering and project management.

Community Environment Support Programme for Schools

The 18-month programme, has involved Groundwork NI working with 11 Primary Schools across North Belfast. It is funded under the EU Urban II Community Initiative through North Belfast Partnership. It aims 'to promote environmental awareness, sustainability and practical environmental action within primary schools in North Belfast' within an Eco-Schools format. It involves Groundwork supporting the schools to undertake school grounds improvements, conduct environmental reviews and develop and implement environmental action plans.

Regeneration Resource Centre

In September 2007 the Trust formally opened the Groundwork Northern Ireland Regeneration Resource Centre in it's Belfast office. The Centre is in Duncairn Gardens, a well-known interface in North Belfast and will be a hub for all those involved in regeneration and social development - promoting environmental, social and economic regeneration. The new facility includes two flexible meeting rooms or one large conference space with a relaxed breakout area. The Centre is fitted out with state of the art multi-media resources including video conferencing.

INTERNATIONAL TREE FOUNDATION


The International Tree Foundation (ITF), originated in the early 1920s in Africa as 'The Men of the Trees'), The Northern Ireland Branch was formed here in 1987. Its Founder, Richard St Barbe Baker, was a forester employed by the colonial government in Kenya. He 'invented' social forestry by involving local people in 'planting and protecting trees'. 'Tree education' is a major part of ITF's objectives.

From the beginning it was resolved to be involved with (mainly primary) schools, to educate children on the 'functions and benefits' of trees and to plant on their invariably bare sites.

The same year the animated film, 'The man who planted trees' was released. From the start, the Branch has used a video of this film (it obtained the permission of CBC to use it), in its activities.

A work sheet has been developed depicting in cartoon form trees' functions and benefits. This work sheet is used in a 'participative learning exercise', with an ITF member stimulating the participation and explaining and recording the 12 functions and benefits on the blackboard.

The visit also involves tree planting. Native whips, seedling trees about a meter tall and easily handled by small children, are used. They would typically be planted in groups so that they grow together in close association and (along with advice from ITF) protect each other from mowers and strimmers.

IRISH HARE INITIATIVE

The Irish Hare Initiative was formed in 2002 to make a tangible and practical contribution to the protection and conservation of our native Irish hare population. This mammal, which is unique to Ireland, survives in fragmented local populations and faces the threat of extinction. This flagship initiative has received international recognition for its success in rehabilitating and releasing orphaned hares. We are pioneering techniques to reintroduce Irish hares to an area where the species became locally extinct almost two decades ago.

At the centre of this initiative is a 56 acre wildlife reserve in the Sperrin area of County Tyrone. This traditional ladder farm is now being developed and managed on sustainable principles to support and enhance the local biodiversity. We believe that this can only be achieved 'from the ground up'. No pesticides, herbicides, nitrates or slurry are used on the reserve and habitat management is carried out sympathetically with regard to the needs and welfare of the wildlife. The reserve now boasts a number of rare or protected species including breeding curlew, lizards, stoats, dragonflies and, of course, Irish hares.

As a working wildlife rehabilitation centre, the reserve does not allow access by the general public. Our animals are cared for in the most natural environment possible with minimal contact with humans. This reduces stress and allows the development of natural behaviour essential for survival in the wild. Closed circuit television is used to monitor the condition and progress of the patients. For the same reason, wild animals in our care are never taken to events or put on public display. All our animals are released back to the wild in line with current best practice.

Environmental education as an element of lifelong learning is central to our conservation strategy. Although we cannot host field visits, we do offer an outreach programme and curriculum support, especially for Key Stage 2. This is usually carried out in partnership with other organisations such as the Owenkillew Community Development Association. We place a great deal of emphasis on designing and delivering learning activities that engage and motivate young people as well as providing teachers and educators with structured programme support.

Our reserve offers volunteering opportunities for adults and youth groups interested in supporting and contributing to our work. We actively promote skill sharing within the community as an element of personal and social development. Team building activities are supported and encouraged and a number of outdoor sports are available locally. Please contact us for more information.

Kilbroney runs similar programmes for groups whether playgroups or youth clubs, Anchor Boys or Guiders. All the environmental education programmes are run by Alliance Youth Works, a youth work resource organisation working in alliance with a number of other partner agencies.

Programmes are fun, exciting and informative and have been created to cover a wide range of learning outcomes and environmental issues, such as classification, identification and behaviour. Students are encouraged to explore and discover nature and begin to better understand it and its influence on us. Wendell Berry said "Our children no longer learn how to read the great Book of Nature from their own experience or how to interact creatively with seasonal transformations of the planet." We seek to redress the balance. We believe that, although there is a strong educational purpose to trips, children and young people should leave Kilbroney enthused and excited about the natural world keen to learn and experience more on returning to their school or club.

The Centre also has 56 beds (2 bed and 4 bed rooms) in two warm, comfortable and spacious buildings and is available for either catered or self-catered primary school residentials. Secondary school orientation residentials are also on offer.

Educational and Interpretive Services

Craigavon Borough Council offers a full environmental education programme as part of our Conservation and Heritage Department. Our education programme caters for students from primary to university level and covers issues relating to the environment of Lough Neagh and Oxford Island.

All activities are facilitated by our knowledgeable and enthusiastic interpretive team based at Oxford Island National Nature Reserve with the aim of raising awareness and enjoyment of the local countryside and wildlife. Our activities include:

- A full range of environmental education activities at Oxford Island,
- Group visits for walks, talks and other activities by prior arrangement,
- Double or split visits to Craigavon Museum based on-site at Oxford Island or at Tannaghmore Gardens Barn Museum.

Our emphasis is on seasonality, looking at the characteristics of the various habitats at specific times of the year. Many topics can be studied throughout the year, however others are best suited to particular season, when particular plants and animals can be seen.

For an off-season alternative we offer an outreach programme with school visits on topics including woodland habitats and pollution and recycling. Outreach visits are developed with an in-season follow up visit to one of out sites.

Riverwatch

Riverwatch is the Loughs Agency's Visitor Centre and Aquarium. Nestled on the banks of the River Foyle, Riverwatch tells the story of the Foyle and Carlingford catchments.

Visitor Centre

From high up in the mountain springs to the brackish loughs, fantastic footage captures the journey of the river, the essence of the local environment and the variety of life in the Foyle and Carlingford areas. Visitors will learn about the local environment through wonderful displays and fantastic local video footage. A range of stories are told using local images from the Foyle and Carlingford area, including the amazing life cycle of the salmon, angling, shellfish, habitats, protection, conservation, water quality and commercial fishing.

Aquarium

The aquarium tanks are an excellent visual resource and a window to a wonderful underwater world. They represent five different habitats and hold some amazing and interesting species.

We have lobsters, crabs, starfish, coalfish, blennys and lots of other marine fish and crustaceans in our Lough Life and Seashore Life Tanks. See the salmon, sticklebacks, minnows, roach and other freshwater fish in the Stream Life, Lake Life and Pond Life Tanks.

Most days, feeding time can be scheduled around your trip. We are continually changing our livestock so it's always worth another trip!

Outreach

The outreach programmes at Riverwatch are catered to compliment the educational curriculum, providing schools with hands-on experience in the riparian and marine environments, local flora and fauna.

At Riverwatch we pride ourselves in our ability to provide programmes which cater for all cross-sections of learning, at every level. This allows us to provide an education programme for the stakeholders of the Foyle and Carlingford catchments, giving them a positive learning experience along with a sense of ownership of their rivers.

Our most popular programme is the 'Salmon in the Classroom'. During February and March a small hatchery system and 100 eggs are delivered to the school for the pupils to care for and nurture. They can see them hatch and develop into fish before releasing them into a local stream. A full education and resource pack supports this programme.

River clean-ups, art projects, school talks, beach walks and other bespoke programmes can be organised to meet the needs of the group. In September 2008 we hope to launch a marine project where schools will be given a treasure chest of resources and a trip to the beach can be organised. 

MAGILLIGAN FIELD CENTRE

Magilligan Field Centre is ideally located to provide stimulating experiences of the natural environment, with good access to one of the most varied and unspoilt parts of the coast of Northern Ireland. The immediate area falls within the Binevenagh Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and many of the study sites are designated Areas of Special Scientific Interest or Nature Reserves. It is an area of strong contrasts between upland environments with peat bog, streams and forest on the basalt escarpment and extensive sand dunes and mud flats on the coastal lowland. We are within comfortable driving distance of the North Antrim coast and the Sperrin Mountains.

Courses - from Early Years to Post Graduate!

Magilligan Field Centre aims to provide field courses that maximise participation through hands-on learning in the environment, structured to facilitate the integration of learning in the field and in the classroom. Courses are regularly updated and closely linked to the Northern Ireland Curriculum and to examination board specifications. Whilst science and geography form the primary focus, other areas include art, history and maths. Courses also seek to incorporate opportunities for developing the Whole Curriculum Skills of Communication, Using Mathematics and ICT, and also Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities, including Working with Others, Problem Solving, Being Creative, Managing Information, and Self-management. Schools may choose from a range of course topics. Alternatively, courses may be tailor made to meet particular needs on request.

KS3, KS4 and post 16:

There are three classrooms for preparatory work prior to fieldwork and for follow up. A computer suite is also available to facilitate the incorporation of ICT within courses.

Qualified teaching staff have a wide experience and knowledge of the local environment, and are available to accompany all groups. Residential groups enjoy excellent catering, comfortable ensuite accommodation for visiting staff and 32 bunk beds for students. A member of staff remains onsite as a Duty Instructor. In 2003 Magilligan Field Centre became the first recipient in Northern Ireland of the Eco-Centres Award for environmentally sustainable practices. 



The Mourne Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty covers 57,000 hectares in South Down. One of Northern Ireland's best known landscapes, the Mountains of Mourne were first designated as an AONB in 1966.

The area provides a wide range of sites for environmental education, from heathland habitats, native oak woodland and plantation forests, to coastal sand dunes and various small rivers. These sites have been recognised for their conservation importance with designations such as National Nature Reserve, ASSI and Special Area for Conservation.

The Mourne Heritage Trust was established in 1997 to provide for the management of the AONB. MHT has a Natural Heritage Outreach Officer, Catherine Bertrand, whose remit is to engage with local schools and other groups to raise awareness of the diversity of wildlife in the Mourne AONB, and to encourage conservation volunteering. Catherine has written to schools on this basis, and is keen to hear from interested schools.

The Trust has a Tree Nursery at the Silent Valley, Kilkeel where various volunteer and community groups work. The Trust can also advise and help facilitate visits to other sites in the Mourne area.

The Trust can also supply worksheets on Natural and Cultural Heritage for Key Stages 1 and 2 which cover seven key themes about the Mourne Area. The Themes are,

- Mountains of Mourne,
- Evidence of the Past,
- Food from the Mournes,
- · Living in the Mournes,
- Biodiversity,
- Mourne Coast,
- The Mournes a Place to Visit.

In addition, the Trust has a series of fact sheets about the Mourne area suitable for secondary level pupils.

The Mourne AONB is home to several outdoor education centres including Tollymore Mountain Centre, Ardnabannon OEC, Shannaghmore OEC, Killowen OEC and Greenhill YMCA.

NORTH EASTERN EDUCATION AND LIBRARY BOARD

The North Eastern Education and Library Board serves the district council areas of Newtownabbey, Carrickfergus, Larne, Moyle, Coleraine, Magherafelt, Ballymena, Ballymoney and Antrim. It provides advice and support to schools and Youth Service on environmental issues and works in partnership with local councils and environmental groups to provide advice and support



on best practice. The NEELB Curriculum Advisory and Support Service (CASS) provide support and guidance to teachers and schools in the area of **Education for Sustainable Development** which is now a statutory element of the Northern Ireland Curriculum. They encourage involvement in Eco-Schools, Best Kept Schools, Eco-UNESCO and many other environmental schemes and awards. CASS also provides support for the new statutory area of **The World Around Us** in the primary curriculum. A World Around Us officer, **Maura Hughes**, is available to give support and advice to primary schools.

The NEELB is unique in that it can offer a complete World Around Us learning experience at the Causeway School at the Giant's Causeway. The school provides two living history experiences based on a Victorian School Day and Life in Recent Times. The visit to the school is supported by an interactive CD ROM specifically developed to support the World Around Us. The CD ROM provides learning activities for before and after the visit and even makes use of the journey to the school. The NEELB works in conjunction with the National Trust to provide a guided walk to the Giant's Causeway which completes the experience. For bookings or further information, contact Dorothy Friar at the Causeway School.

The Causeway School is open to the public in July and August.

Recent School Achievements

For the second year running a NEELB school has scooped the "Best of the Best" at the Best Kept Schools Award. Ballykeel PS in Ballymena was seen to be at "the cutting edge of environmental education" with its vegetable beds, traditional orchard and plans for a 6kw wind turbine.

Two NEELB schools already have wind turbines. Dunseverick PS won their turbine in an Eco-Schools competition and the turbine at St Patrick's PS is now a net contributor to the national grid. St Anne's PS Corkey has come up trumps in two UK competitions with its science project on water quality in Glenarrif and the Mournes. The school won the UK Rolls-Royce Science prize and the Eden Project Award.

NEELB post-primary schools have also been active in environmental work. St Colm's HS Draperstown, who achieved their first green flag last year, held a highly successful Eco Fair for their local primary schools and went on to enter two projects for the Eco-UNESCO Young Environmentalist of the Year. Both projects reached the last 40 and the showcase at the Mansion House in Dublin, with their project on energy conservation in the school taking Best in Category. Year 11 pupil Ethan Kerr won the Sustainable Energy Category of the Life through a Lens Competition and his work will be on display in Sustainable Energy Ireland's 2009 calendar.

St Patrick's College Maghera organised a very successful Sustainable Energy in the Home Exhibition for schools in the mid-Ulster region.



Northern Ireland Water places great importance on educating young people in the vital role water plays in our daily lives. Our Education Programme raises an awareness and understanding of water for health, the cleaning of water and wastewater, water conservation and its effect on sustainability. These are tailored to complement the enriched curriculum.



This service is available all year round free of charge.

Education Visits

- Silent Valley Education Centre offers the opportunity to improve knowledge and understanding of the environment. Pupils learn of its history and biodiversity through hands-on experience and interesting surroundings. Teachers can choose one of four topics along with the main focus on the history of supply of and demand for water.
- Heritage Wastewater Education Centre in the industrial heart of Belfast. Learn about the sights and smells of Belfast's sewage system past and present. Pupils have the opportunity to explore how sewage is cleaned and investigate why this process is important to the health of the city. Examine how pollution effects our water courses and the impact it has on our natural environment.
- NIW Treatment Works. These visits can be arranged for pupils from aged 10 and up.
- Visits to schools. The water education team will attend primary schools in our mobile waterbus or present classroom sessions on "water conservation", "water for health", "cleaning of water and wastewater" to individual year groups. We also provide support to schools on the Eco-Schools programme. The water education team are trained Eco-School Assessors. Water audits of schools should be available from 2009.

Primary and Secondary Schools

Outdoor Education Programmes

We run KS1 and KS2 curriculum-linked, field-teaching programmes at a number of sites, offering a range of habitats. In partnership with CAFRE (College of Agriculture Food and Rural Enterprise) RSPB offers programmes for schools at: Greenmount Campus, Antrim and Enniskillen College Campus.

Our programmes provide a basic introduction to birds and the wonder of the environment through our KS1 'First Nature' sensory programme. Building on that basic knowledge, our KS2 programme 'Second Nature' offers a more in-depth study of habitats and adaptation involving lots of hands-on investigation.

While each Centre offers particular specialisms, all focus on the holistic (academic, physical, personal and social) development of young people. Both Centres are fully staffed and equipped to provide their particular specialism and can cater for people on a fully catered residential basis. Comfortable accommodation, good food and a friendly, welcoming atmosphere are all the ingredients required to ensure optimum enjoyment and learning for all.

ARDNABANNON (100 BEDS)

Originally an old Victorian house set in its own grounds of 16 acres, Ardnabannon is the largest of the Board's two Centres. Situated in the north side of the Mourne Mountains, approximately 35 miles form Belfast, it is ideally located to make maximum use of the natural resources available on our mountain, forest, inland water and coastal environments.

KILLYLEAGH (40 BEDS)

Situated on the western shore of Strangford Lough (designated an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) and of Scientific Interest) on the periphery of Killyleagh town, the Centre commands a spectacular vista over the Lough and the surrounding area. Here, as you would expect, the location encourages water activities based on the Lough with sailing being a key feature of the programme. An ideal venue for those groups wishing to gain their first experience in one of the water-related activities with sailing, canoeing and power boating being the more popular activity choices with visiting groups. There is also plenty of opportunity to participate in many of the other activities associated with a residential visit which enhance teamwork and respect for one's peers and the environment in which we live.

SOUTHERN EDUCATION AND LIBRARY BOARD



The SELB provides advice and support to schools and Youth Service through a managed approach to procurement, transport, waste, energy and education. The Board works in partnership with local councils and environmental groups to support and inform schools and the Youth Service of environmental programmes, policy and best practice. The SELB Curriculum Advisory and Support Service (CASS) is committed to providing support and guidance to teachers and schools in the area of Education for Sustainable Development and encouraging protection and appreciation of our built and natural environment and heritage. Education for Sustainable Development is a statutory part of the Northern Ireland Curriculum and we encourage student-led programmes and involvement in, for example, ECO-Schools and competitions including ECO challenge and ECO UNESCO.

The SELB is the only Education Board which has received confirmation that its environmental management system is compliant with ISO 14001. Dromore High School has also achieved ISO 14001 status.

Recent SELB projects have included:

- Craigavon Sustainable Schools Programme which involved partnering an educational initiative across a range of schools through energy efficiency investment.
- Involvement in judging the Environmental Youth Speak competition which is now in its tenth year and aims to encourage environmental awareness among young people.
- The 'Switched on Schools' project which has been submitted for a number of awards.

A number of our schools have achieved Eco-Schools bronze, silver and Green Flag awards. In 2007, St. Catherine's College, Armagh was the overall ECO UNESCO winner with three other SELB schools winning their sections. Banbridge High School's Geography Club, supported tirelessly by Geography teacher Jennifer McClelland, has send pupils to Stormont, Downing Street and the G8 summit in Germany. The school has just won an all Ireland Cape Farewell Local to Global Video competition sponsored by The British Council. One lucky pupil from Banbridge High School will witness climate change firsthand by participating in an expedition to the Arctic in September 2008. A pupil from Windsor Hill Primary School, Newry recently won the Southern Group Environmental Community Eco-Challenge. The winning poster gained a bicycle (with safety equipment) for the winning pupil and an eco-computer for the school.

The global dimension is now a core element of the revised Northern Ireland Curriculum, forming an integral part of compulsory provision. It is placed within a more general government drive to engage innovatively with some of the most challenging questions our society is dealing with today regarding conflict and peace, poverty and excess wealth, interdependence and dependence, and human rights and justice.



With this in mind, St. Mary's University College set up the Global Dimension in Education Project which aims to prepare student teachers to implement this aspect of the curriculum effectively by integrating it across the College community.

Integral to the Project has been the development of an on-line course to support students completing the Certificate in the Global Dimension in Education. The Global Dimension On Line Course points you in the right direction for ideas on how to incorporate the eight global dimension concepts successfully in to your teaching and learning. Also provides information and links to many of the key statutory bodies and Non Governmental Organisations (NGOs) who can provide support and help you get started.

- Introduction to the Global Dimension.
- Certification Information (for St. Mary's Students only),
- NI Statutory Bodies and NGOs,
- Planning, Resources and Projects,
- Global Dimension Conferences (in St. Mary's University College),
- Activities.

School Buildings

We believe that new school buildings should be designed to be produce zero carbon, zero waste and zero congestion; that they should minimise water use, grow food and manage their buildings and grounds to enhance learning, play and biodiversity conservation; and that they should serve as demonstration centres for sustainable living within their communities. The SDC commissioned the Buildings Research Establishment to analyse current energy consumption patterns in schools and evaluate low cost carbon reducing measures. This report is available on our website.

School Food

Another recent report, Double Dividend, produced by the Sustainable Consumption Roundtable tackles the issues surrounding the promotion of good nutrition and sustainable consumption through healthy school meals. It makes several key recommendations for improving the sustainability of school meals, including using seasonal menus, local food suppliers and serving less, but better quality meat.

The T.A.C.T. Wildlife Centre is open for school visits throughout the year. A variety of activities can be arranged, from a guided tour and talk on the animals at the Centre to more specific projects incorporating topics of interest. T.A.C.T. provides a visual and real experience in contact with animals. This brings understanding and awareness of local wildlife.

At any one time there are approximately 350 creatures living at the Centre. These long term residents become ambassadors for their species and may be used as resources to teach adults and children of all ages and abilities about wildlife, conservation, the need to promote and protect the environment and make the school curriculum come alive in a unique way.

T.A.C.T. is available to visit schools right across the country at all times of the school year.

Off-site resources include:

ULSTER AMERICAN FOLK PARK

The Ulster American Folk Park is an outdoor museum which tells the story of life in Ireland and America in the 18th and 19th centuries, brought together by the experience of emigration. Costumed guides help school groups to explore Irish and American exhibit buildings, many of which are original buildings, relocated to the Park. Students can also join in traditional workshops such as woodcraft, corn dolly making, spinning and find out about traditional crops and foodstuffs.

The Folk Park is set in approximately 80 acres of grassland and natural woodlands and is thus particularly well suited for environmental education activities. As well as general tours with an emphasis on environmental education, we offer two specific programmes:

1. The 'Living Lightly' Environmental Trail is designed to encourage pupils to explore the natural environment of the Folk Park and raise issues relating to sustainable development.

Children follow the trail in groups guided by trained and costumed staff. They are encouraged to discuss environmental issues as they arise on the course of the trail. Topics covered include:

- Birds and animals of Ireland; the extent of their habitat in the past compared with the present,
- The different types of lichen growing within the Folk Park and its use as an indicator of air purity,
- Investigation of the peatland habitat,
- Native Irish and American tree species and investigation of the woodland habitat,
- Medicinal use of plants.
- **2.** 'Going Wild' is a workshop activity where participants explore the uses of naturally occurring flora, e.g. heather, nettles, gorse, rushes, wild fruit, etc. The activities undertaken vary with the seasons.

They visited several local schools, some of which were part of the Zomba Action Project at Coleraine Borough Council. A UU scholarship fund has been established to allow either a postgraduate research student or staff member from Chancellor College to visit the School of Education at Ulster and to spend some time in Northern Ireland engaging in research and visiting schools.


