- Encourage biodiversity and understand



# CREGGAN COUNTRY PARK

### **Overview**

Creggan Country Park Enterprises is a not-for-profit social firm established in February 1997, located on the 100-acre former Creggan Reservoirs site on the Northern boundary of Derry's Creggan estate. It aims to provide balanced opportunities in training, employment, recreation and education for the local community.

Creggan Country Park is host to the city's first and only inflatable assault course on water. Other activities include canoeing, kayaking, paddle boarding, team building, assault course, orienteering and the recently introduced environmental education programme 'Nature's Classroom.' Creggan Country Park works continuously to encourage environmental awareness through programmes of environmental education, planting and community clean-up programmes and a robust development programme incorporating renewable energy technologies which include a biomass boiler and hydro-electric scheme. The Creggan Country Park activity centre also features a turf roof, which is designed for energy efficiency.

'Nature's Classroom' is funded by the Department of Social Development and is available for schools and community groups free of charge all year round. Activities can take place on our 100-acre site. There are 13 educational themes to choose from including 'Power from the Planet or Renewable Energy Workshop', which gets pupils up close to renewable technologies. The Big Bug Hunt and Treemendous Tree Hunt are fantastic ways to get pupils up close to nature.

The Primary education programme links into the subject area 'The World Around Us' in the revised curriculum for NI. Our post primary themes are related to Learning for Life & Work—local and global citizenship, Geography and Science in the revised curriculum.

School visits are arranged on a first come first served basis. Activities available on site and require advanced booking.

### Lough Neagh Discovery Centre





#### Who we are

The Lough Neagh Discovery Centre is a visitor centre situated within Oxford Island National Nature Reserve on the southern shore of Lough Neagh. Located just off the M1 motorway the centre and the nature reserve offer a variety of facilities for school children and members of the public to enjoy.

The Lough Neagh Discovery Centre is an ideal place to begin exploring the local natural environment. Facilities include a tourist information point, conference rooms and café. A purpose built education room is available for visiting school groups, which can be used for talks and activities and as a lunch room.

### **Education Programmes**

The Discovery Centre is home to the Armagh City, Banbridge and Craigavon Borough Council's Conservation Service. The service runs a wide range of environmental education programmes, environmental events and activities designed to educate and inspire children and adults of all ages and abilities to become more aware of local biodiversity conservation, and the protection of local and global environments.

All are delivered by knowledgeable and experienced staff. Annually the team works with approx. 8,000 students from a range of different school, youth and community groups and through a variety of events.

Educational programmes are available to school groups from the nursery and primary sectors through to secondary schools and colleges of further education. Programmes are tailored to suit the needs of each individual group and the resources and habitats of Oxford Island National Nature Reserve offer excellent opportunities for field work and investigative studies.

Evaluation and monitoring ensure a quality service is delivered and programmes are kept up to date with changes in the curriculum.

The Conservation Service gained the prestigious 'Learning outside the Classroom Quality Badge' for the third time in 2020, recognizing the high standard of the education and learning programmes delivered by the Education Team.

### **Primary School Programmes**

We run a variety of programmes and activities at Oxford Island for children of primary school age based on Woodland, Freshwater and Grassland habitats. Pupils can explore the plant and animal life associated with each habitat and how these areas are important to wildlife and people.

### **Nursery and Foundation**

A shorter programme has been specially developed for nursery and foundation years dedicated to encouraging the under 5's age group to learn and appreciate the world around them. Activities include woodland discovery walks, minibeast hunts, butterfly spotting, bird watching and arts and crafts.



### **Post Primary Programmes**

Programmes for secondary schools allow pupils to explore the habitats of Oxford Island and the ecosystem of Lough Neagh. These examine the communities of plants and animals found in the fresh water, woodland and grassland habitats and the impact of human activities upon them. Vegetation surveys allow the pupils to look at succession and changes in plant and animal communities using transect lines, quadrats pit-fall traps and other sampling techniques. The use of additional methods of recording and measuring biodiversity can be demonstrated in appropriate environments through the use of pooters, sweep-nets and pit-fall traps.

Outreach Programmes are available to schools on a variety of environmental topics including Garden birds, Minibeasts, Wildlife, habitats and biodiversity and Water. These programmes are all delivered in the classroom and are a great alternative to school trips especially during the winter months.

Growing your school grounds - This as a programme which has been designed to help schools make the most of their grounds. Staff from the Lough Neagh Discovery Centre can help teachers and pupils to develop pupil led projects which will enhance the environment and promote biodiversity.

- Setting up of raised beds and the growing of vegetables, flowers and herbs.
- Minibeast hotel
- Compost heaps
- Habitat creation and features to help wildlife.

Staff can help the children plan a series of projects for their school grounds and make a plan to tackle the work. The programme helps schools when they are setting out to achieve elements of their Green Flag award. (Most suitable for Key Stage 2 pupils)

The Education Team is also responsible for running a number of Events throughout the year to engage members of the public in biodiversity projects in an informal way.

## Magilligan Field Centre



Magilligan Field Centre is ideally located to provide stimulating learning experiences of the natural environment, with good access to one of the most varied and unspoilt parts of the coast of Northern Ireland. The immediate area falls within the Binevenagh Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and many of the study sites used are designated Areas of Special Scientific Interest or Nature Reserves.

It is an area of strong contrasts between upland environments with peat bog, streams and forests on the basalt escarpment and extensive sand dunes and mud flats on the coastal lowland. We are within comfortable driving distance of the North Antrim coast and the Sperrin Mountains. MFC is accessible by an hourly rail service on the main Belfast to Derry/Londonderry line.

### Early Years KS1 & 2

Investigating The World Around Us- MFC provides active learning opportunities to develop cross-curricular skills, thinking skills and personal capabilities and supports Primary Areas of Learning including STEM.

MFC offers appropriately structured investigations of a range of habitats in the local area- lake, stream, woodland and shore. All courses focus on active pupil participation and enjoyment. Activities include pond dipping, woodland minibeast hunts, beach studies, weather measurements, art work and ICT based follow up work.

As well as using the varied local environments, trips are also organised to Rathlin Island, the Giant's Causeway, Ballintoy Harbour and across the Foyle ferry to Greencastle, Co. Donegal.

**Facilities:** MFC provides an extensive range of appropriate field work equipment and specialist outdoor protective clothing. In addition to three well equipped teaching classrooms the Centre has an ICT suite to facilitate follow up work.

Qualified teaching staff have a wide experience and knowledge of the local environment and are available to accompany all groups. Residential groups enjoy excellent catering, comfortable ensuite accommodation for visiting staff and 32 bunk beds for students.

A member of staff remains onsite overnight as a Duty Instructor. MFC aims to promote the understanding of sustainable living by exemplifying good practice.





### Northern Ireland Forest School Assocation (NIFSA)

The Northern Ireland Forest School Association was established in 2008. The sole aim is to develop and deliver sustainable environmental education projects across Northern Ireland. The Belfast Education & Library Board have endorsed the NIFSA Forest School programme - Dr. Gillian Humes, BELB Science Advisor said: "This is one of the few projects that truly integrates all elements of the revised curriculum. It incorporates aspects of history, geography and science, delivers an opportunity to develop thinking skills and personal capabilities, and has a strong emphasis on promoting numeracy and literacy. Even more importantly than this, the initiative connects children to their outdoor environment, stimulating curiosity and inspiring a love of the natural world that is likely to remain long after the end of primary school. Teachers participating in the project are well supported with expertise and resources, and enjoy the project as much as the children." NIFSA has developed the only Forest School qualification available in Northern Ireland, a range of specifically tailored lesson plans for use in an outdoor setting and lobby's Government and non-Government organisations in supporting Forest School Programmes. NIFSA, working in partnership with local Councils, the Public Health Agency, The Dufferin Foundation and others deliver The Forest School Awards Programme. A unique programme specifically designed to support school, youth organisations and families to get involved in Forest Schools. There are over 220 schools currently involved and this supports over 1,000 children learning outside every week in Northern Ireland.



### Why was it set up?

Research nationally has highlighted the lack of opportunity and practical engagement children have with their natural environment. This has major consequences for the future of our natural landscape character as they will become the future custodians of this environment. It is also having immediate consequences with one in four children in Northern Ireland being classified as obese and a huge rise in mental illness in children and young adults.

### What is a Forest School?

A Forest School is an innovative educational approach to outdoor play and learning. The philosophy of Forest Schools is to encourage and inspire individuals of any age through positive outdoor experiences. By participating in simple achievable tasks and activities, on a regular basis in a woodland environment, each participant has an opportunity to develop intrinsic motivation, sound emotional and social skills and experience first-hand the landscape character of the local area. Forest Schools has demonstrated success with children of all ages who visit the same local woodlands on a regular basis and through play and discovery, have the opportunity to learn about the natural environment, how to handle risks and most importantly to use their own initiative to solve problems and co-operate with others. Forest School programmes run throughout the year. going to the woods in all weathers (except for high winds). Children use full sized tools, play, learn boundaries of behaviour; both physical and social, establish and grow in confidence, self-esteem and become selfmotivated.

### Forest Schools will aim to develop:

- Self Awareness
- Self-Regulation
- Intrinsic motivation
- Empathy
- Good social communication skills
- Independence
- A positive mental attitude, self-esteem and confidence

Forest School, through its application of Accelerated Learning techniques creates a unique learning vehicle that is used to encourage a range of individuals, community groups and larger organisations to utilise their local open space for interactive play, health, recreation and personal development uses.

### **School Grounds Development Projects**

TCV can support work to improve school grounds anywhere in Northern Ireland from one of our local offices. Our aim is to involve pupils and teachers in the design, implementation, maintenance and use of school grounds projects. Teachers are encouraged to maximise opportunities to incorporate the Northern Ireland Curriculum into as many aspects of their school grounds as possible. We can help implement projects to create or improve ponds, trees, woodlands, wildflower meadows, hedges, paths and living willow structures. This work can involve children, teachers and parents, but we can also undertake work on our own, including jobs that might not be suitable for children to do. Costs are variable depending upon project size, duration and materials required.

# The Eco-Schools Programme

The Eco-Schools programme provides an ideal way to foster environmental awareness in the entire school in a way that links many curriculum subjects. The programme is pupil lead, participatory and designed to educate and empower young people to make positive decisions and become change makers for an environmentally sustainable world.

Eco-Schools extends learning beyond the classroom and develops responsible attitudes and commitment, both at home and in the wider community. The programme runs in over 60 countries around the world and engages 18 million pupils, making it the world's largest environmental education programme.

Here in Northern Ireland, the Eco-Schools Programme is operated by Keep Northern Ireland Beautiful, an environmental charity, and is supported by the Department of Agriculture, Environment & Rural Affairs and other organisations. Local councils and our network of delivery partners also offer invaluable practical support for the programme.

Schools structure their environmental work around a seven step process and progress towards the internationally recognised Eco-Schools Green Flag award.

Schools can chose from ten different topics as they work towards their awards: Waste, Litter, Water, Transport, Biodiversity, Outdoor Learning, Energy, Healthy Living, Global Perspective and Climate Change.



# Ulster Wildlife Grassroots Challenge – Youth Action For Wildlife





Ulster Wildlife's 'Grassroots Challenge' project brings the great outdoors to life for young people, aged 11-24, through Young Farmers' Clubs of Ulster, Duke of Edinburgh's Award and Special Schools across Northern Ireland.

This project is supported by the National Lottery Community Fund through the UK Our Bright Future initiative.

### Action4Wildlife Awards - Open to all

If your School or Youth Group is doing something to benefit Wildlife and the Environment then register this with Ulster Wildlife's Action4Wildlife Awards. This scheme gives recognition to children and young people for the time they spend helping the natural world. Participants get a Bronze, Silver or Gold Award based on the amount of time they spend on their eco activities.

They also get invited to the Annual Grassroots Challenge Celebration event and get to be nominated for special Best Activity and Environmental Leader Awards.

### Grassroots Challenge Programmes for specific groups:

### Young Farmers Clubs of Ulster (YFCU)

Individuals and groups/clubs from YFCU design, develop and deliver environmental projects within their own community with support from Project Officers. Projects can range in size and scope and can take place over one day or several months to a year.

Each participating club/group will have the opportunity to be assessed against key areas and work towards achieving an Eco-Club award. A one day LANTRA accredited training course called Conservation on the Farm is available as well as other countryside management training opportunities.



### Duke of Edinburgh's Award/Joint Award Initiative (DofE)

The Grassroots Challenge programme supports young people to complete the volunteering, skills, expedition or residential sections of their Award through activities that benefit wildlife and the environment.

Volunteering project grants of up to £300 are available. Volunteering placement opportunities, skills starter packs, wildlife expedition packs and training sessions plus a Gold level Wildlife and Outdoor Adventure Residential are all available.

### Special Schools (Post primary age only)


Our Project Officer delivers a series of nature and wildlife sessions to participating classes within their own school grounds with close liaison with teachers to ensure sessions are best suited to those taking part. Each participating class will then be supported to design, develop and deliver a 'Wild Ideas' environmental project within their school grounds and/or local community.

Costs: Free to Young Farmers' Clubs, Duke of Edinburgh's Award groups and Special Schools.


